Hand Hygiene

5th May is World Hand Hygiene Day

Save Lives: Clean Your Hands - Help stop the spread of harmful germs in healthcare.

Together, we can prevent infections and antimicrobial resistance (AMR) in your health care setting and build a culture of safety and quality in which hand hygiene is given high priority.

Hands may look clean, but micro-organisms are always present. Hand hygiene saves lives when performed correctly at the right time.

When to wash hands

The 5 key moments of hand hygiene to prevent transmission of infection

- Before contact with a resident
- > Before any aseptic task
- After exposure to blood or bodily fluid
- > After supporting a resident to use the toilet or with personal hygiene
- After contact with a resident, such as use of a hoist, helping them to walk, dress or eat.

Soap and water or hand sanitiser?

Liquid soap and water

Hand washing correctly with soap and water is always preferable to using hand sanitiser. In particular, when there has been:

- Exposure to blood or bodily fluid or risk of this exposure, such as taking someone to the toilet or bathing them
- > Exposure to someone who has sickness or diarrhoea or C. difficile
- When you have removed your gloves
- When your hands are visibly soiled.

Hand sanitiser

The correct use of hand sanitiser can also be used to thoroughly decontaminate hands. Situations where hand sanitiser can be used include:

- > Before entering residents' rooms and before touching a resident or their surroundings
- > After touching a resident or their surroundings
- > Don't use hand sanitiser if your hands are visibly soiled or if there has been exposure, or risk of exposure, to an infectious disease or blood or bodily fluid.

How to wash hands

- Follow the steps carefully
- Ensure you use enough liquid soap or hand sanitiser
- ➤ Complete each action for 3-5 seconds ensuring a good coverage of liquid soap or sanitiser





Hand Hygiene Facts

- Appropriate use of hand hygiene can prevent up to 50% of avoidable infections during healthcare delivery. Guidelines and evidence (who.int)

The gloves off campaign was created by an NHS Lead Nurse for Infection Prevention and Control and two NHS Lead Practice Educators to address the over-use of non-sterile gloves.

When used correctly, medical gloves are a vital part of personal protective equipment (PPE). But there are many occasions when gloves are not needed, and hand hygiene is completely effective at protecting you and your residents.

You do not have to wear gloves when...



Checking blood pressure



Dispensing medication to a resident



Handing out food & drinks



Pushing a chair, trolly or bed & mobilising a resident



Touching a resident



Using a phone or computer



Giving IM injections & drawing IV medication
