Cumbria Updates:

Buddhist Member of SACRE Talks To Pupils At Richmond Hill

Living in Cumbria, it can be quite a challenge to enable our pupils to have access to a diverse range of religious view-points. I contacted Wendy last year to see if she could help broaden my year 4 class's understanding of Buddhism, which is one of the major world faiths they explore in this year group. As Wendy does not live in close proximity to our school, she suggested doing a Zoom meet-up with the class. Prior to the Zoom session, the class watched a short video from the Virtual Visits Project, where Wendy introduces herself and explains why she became a Buddhist: *My Personal Worldview Story by Wendy (Virtual Voices in Religious Education Project)*.



After watching the video, the class were then in a better position to be able to think of questions they'd liked to ask Wendy about her faith and values. Knowing they were going to be speaking to a practising Buddhist, really helped the children reflect back on their prior learning, as well as enabling them to ask questions that were of personal interest to them. The class absolutely loved being given the opportunity to put their questions to Wendy and I feel they have taken away from the experience a long lasting understanding of some of the key principles of Buddhism. Wendy has now hosted two virtual meet-ups for our year 4 students and on both occasions, the children have engaged really positively with the experience.

<u>Cumbria SACRE meets at The Queen Katherine School, Kendal and meets students to talk about RE</u>

Cumbria SACRE had its Spring meeting at The Queen Katherine School in Kendal who kindly agreed to host the meeting. During the meeting SACRE members were privileged to meet a number of students at the school. SACRE members and the students discussed the question: *Given the results of the Census 2021 in Cumbria, is there any point in teaching about Buddhism, Hindu Dharma, Islam, Judaism, or Sikhi?* This question was prompted by the results of the census indicating there are comparatively few members of faiths other than Christianity in Cumbria (see page 6 for more information about the census results). Students argued that such few numbers made the teaching of other faiths in Cumbria more essential, not less. Students needed to know the varied beliefs and practices of those living in the UK and the world. Their future life and work would not necessarily be in Cumbria alone.

Other questions were also considered which were: 'What do you value most about RE?' and 'What would you change about RE?' Students valued the opportunity in RE to discuss and explore fundamental questions and issues. They also expressed the wish that RE could, where possible, involve more direct conversations with people of different beliefs because this gave a different and very valuable perspective other than studying such beliefs from a text book alone.

Cumbria Updates: (Continued)

Are you New or Aspiring to Lead RE?

In March, the Chair and Professional Adviser for Cumbria SACRE, Jane Yates facilitated a new online course for teachers who were new or aspiring to lead RE. It was encouraging to meet ECT teachers who are already on the pathway to lead RE and are keen to become better informed. In one school, the current RE lead came along with the aspiring lead. The focus of the session was to provide an opportunity to engage with latest thinking in RE, especially in light of the new Cumbria Agreed Syllabus for RE. There was a particular focus on religious literacy through a disciplinary approach. As well as practical tools and approaches to support high-quality RE, teachers were also signposted to opportunities to undertake scholarly study to support their leadership of RE (please see the CPD page 13 for some examples).

Also joining the session was Assistant Education Director for the Diocese of Carlisle, Laura Watson, who gave a presentation about Understanding Christianity. National RE trainer, Gill Vaisey also provided a 7 minute recorded presentation about her range of resources, including a focus on a new digital resource for EYFS and Humanism. How well are you 'taking care' of RE in your school?

SACRE & Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)

As you will know, two new unitary authorities of Cumberland and Westmorland and Furness will come into existence on 1 April 2023. This raises questions about the future of SACRE provision for these new areas once Cumbria County Council (CCC) ceases to exist.

A recommendation was made to the two Shadow Authorities that a joint SACRE should be established to operate from 1 April. Both Shadow Authorities have now agreed to this proposal. Therefore, from April 1st there will **remain one joint SACRE** for both Cumberland and Westmorland and Furness.

The one joint SACRE will ensure continuity, but a joint SACRE will also have the opportunity to make changes in its constitution to ensure the needs of both Cumberland as well as Westmorland and Furness are met.

<u>'A Religious Education for the Future'.</u> The Revision of the Agreed Syllabus for RE


The last revision of the Cumbria Agreed Syllabus for RE was in 2017. The Agreed Syllabus must be revised every 5 years. Therefore, SACRE has been working with teachers and faith representatives on this revision. The new revised syllabus will now be for both Cumberland as well as Westmorland and Furness.

Cumbria SACRE are adopting the Norfolk Agreed Syllabus and are making some revisions to build on the current syllabus and reflect the context of Cumbria. The new revised syllabus is entitled: 'A Religious Education for the Future – Understanding Religion and Worldviews for a Life in a New World'. The aims of the syllabus are to use a multi-disciplinary approach (theological, philosophical and human/social sciences) so that young people are enabled to:

- know about and understand a range of religious and non-religious worldviews,
- express ideas and insights about the nature, significance and impact of religious and non-religious worldviews,
- gain and deploy skills rooted in this multi-disciplinary approach and so engage critically with religious and non-religious worldviews.

It is proposed to launch the syllabus for Sept 2023 and there would then follow a year of implementation with it becoming legal in Sept 2024. This is to ensure there will be time and CPD for schools in preparing to implement the revised syllabus. Planning for this CPD is already ongoing, working with other SACREs and with the CofE diocesan education staff.

We are confident that this new revised syllabus will provide a framework and opportunities for exciting RE in the future



Cumbria SACRE Primary & Secondary RE Conference 2023



We are delighted with the huge number of primary and secondary teachers who are already booked on the Cumbria SACRE RE conference on Monday 26th June at the North Lakes Hotel, Penrith. Places are strictly limited to 100 and there are now only around 20 places left.

A full programme has now been devised (see final page of the newsletter) which supports the launch of the new Cumbria Agreed Syllabus (serving Cumberland and Westmorland and Furness LAs). The title of the conference is: A Religious Education for the Future – Understanding Religion and Worldviews for a Life in a Changing World. It will include a mix of presentations and workshops across primary and secondary phases, with specific workshops for KS4/5 and EYFS during the afternoon. There will also be a presentation by pupils/teachers from North Lakes School in conjunction with ClickView UK. This session will focus on the impact of film in the RE classroom from a research-led perspective.

Main Presenters:

Stephen Pett is a primary and secondary specialist with many years of experience of leading RE in secondary education. He is currently a National Advisor for RE Today and has contributed to developing the draft handbook for the RE Council for Religion and Worldviews in the Classroom: developing a Worldviews Approach. **Saima Saleh** teaches full time at a primary school in Surrey and leads the NATRE Local Groups Network. She is also a member of her local SACRE and a NATRE Executive member. Saima took part in the Stage 1 and 2 RE Leadership Programme run by Culham St Gabriel's. She has a particular interest in anti-racism and strives to raise awareness of this through her work.


SAPERE Level 2A Advanced course for Philosophy for Children(P4C)

For the first time, an advanced Level 2A P4C course will be held in West Cumbria in conjunction with <u>One Cumbria</u> and <u>SAPERE</u> (the national charity for P4C). This 2-day course is for primary and secondary teaching staff who are already trained at Level 1 and would like to advance their philosophical facilitation skills and support less experienced members of staff across school. This course is perfect for developing practice or as a refresher. It fits well with a disciplinary approach to religious literacy, advocated in the new Cumbria SACRE Agreed Syllabus for RE. National Updates

Results of Religious Questions from 2021 Census

The results of the religion questions from the 2021 Census were released at the end of November 2023. The main findings were:



- "No religion" was the second most common response, increasing by 12.0 percentage points to 37.2% (22.2 million) from 25.2% (14.1 million) in 2011.
- There were increases in the number of people who described themselves as "Muslim" (3.9 million, 6.5% in 2021, up from 2.7 million, 4.9% in 2011) and "Hindu" (1.0 million, 1.7% in 2021, up from 818,000, 1.5% in 2011).
- London remains the most religiously diverse region of England in 2021, with over a quarter (25.3%) of all usual residents reporting a religion other than "Christian"; the North East and South West are the least religiously diverse regions, with 4.2% and 3.2%, respectively, selecting a religion other than "Christian".

People in Cumbria describing themselves as other main religions in England was less than 0.5% except for Muslim in Carlisle (0.8%) and Barrow (0.5%). 0% described themselves as Sikh in all LA Cumbrian districts and 0% describe themselves as Jewish in all districts except in Eden (0.1%) and South Lakeland (0.1%)

Parliamentary Questions About RE

In January, the Secretary of State for education, Nick Gibb MP answered parliamentary written questions asked by Janet Daby MP. The first question asked which local authorities entered the (a) highest and (b) lowest proportion of their year 11 cohort for GCSE Religious Studies in the 2022-23 academic year. The minister provided a table ranking each local authority in relation to the number of entries for GCSE Religious Studies in 2022. The range is significant; from 14.4% to 81.0%. The Cumbria data is below (next page) and you can find the full table here.

Nick Gibb MP was also asked by Janet Daby MP for an estimate of the number and proportion of teachers of (a) religious education, (b) geography, (c) history and (d) English who spent the majority of their timetabled hours teaching each subject in the last 12 months. The Minister provided information collected from the annual School Workforce each November. This information showed that 51% of the total of secondary teachers of RE spend most of their teaching timetable delivering a different subject. The full response can be viewed here.

Religion and Philosophy is a Hot Topic between Parents and their Children:

A survey carried out by Culham St Gabriel's into attitudes among parents towards religious education has found that religious and philosophical themes are a major talking point at home between parents and their children. The survey was carried out by Culham St Gabriel's who wanted to understand how parents see their children's religious education on the eve of the Census 2021 results that showed a decline in the number of people who wish to identify themselves with a single specific organised religion. The survey involved 2000 parent responses and found: Around 8 in 10 discuss beliefs about the origins of life and the universe (78%), around 7 in 10 discuss beliefs that affect people's behaviour and decision making (77%), around 7 in 10 discuss issues related to religious and non-religious worldviews that appear in the media (67%)

Campaign for a National Plan for RE:

"We want all children in all schools to receive a high-quality education in RE/an education in religion and worldviews taught by well-qualified and trained teachers." NATRE and the REC are calling for support for their campaign for a National Plan for RE. They are campaigning for a National Plan for RE because: 'RE is vital for life in the modern world', 'RE is valued by the voting public' but 'too many children are not receiving RE', 'recruitment of secondary trainees is insufficient' and 'too many primary teachers have no RE training'. RE Teacher Recruitment Webinar:

Working Together to Promote RE Teaching as a Career, was a webinar held on 6th March. Dr Kathryn Wright and Deborah Weston OBE explored this important topic. The Chair of Cumbria SACRE attended this session. As well as giving valuable insight into the statistics around recruitment, the session introduced a new social media campaign to change the narrative and remove some of the barriers. Research by The RE Policy Unit (2022) exposed that the DfE has missed their target for the recruitment of RE teachers in 9 of the last 10 years. From 2020/21 to 2021/22 there was a decline of nearly 200 trainees enrolling on RE ITT courses and a 150% national increase in RE vacancies (School Workforce Census 2022), many unfilled. 51% of secondary teachers of RE, spend most of their timetable teaching a completely different subject, and RE teacher recruitment is now a post code lottery, with areas such as the East-Midlands and the Northeast being particularly badly affected.

Westminster Debate on RE:

In November 2022, a Westminster Hall debate heard cross-party calls of support for religious education, as MPs urged the Government to do more to protect the subject they considered vital for young people in modern Britain. The debate, entitled *'Religious Education in Modern Britain'*, was called by Conservative MP Martin Vickers who cited concerns about the number of schools not fulfilling their statutory responsibility to teach the subject. At year 11, one school in five reported offering zero hours of RE.

During the hour and a half debate, members across the House spoke on the subject's importance for fostering mutual understanding in society, as well as the world beyond Britain where 70% have a religious affiliation. Statement on the Results of the Religion Question from the Census 2021:

"The 2021 England and Wales census results are a great opportunity to discuss the changing nature of belief in modern Britain. Although it appears that affiliation to a traditional religious worldview is falling, with 'no religion' being the second most common response, there is a growing body of evidence to suggest that young people are continuing to engage with questions of a religious and philosophical nature. Ticking 'No religion' in the census box does not mean that person does not reflect on the big questions in life.

In light of this, we need religious education in schools to reflect the pluralistic, diverse and often complicated belief in modern Britain - where a worldview may be made up of both religious and non-religious ideas. Every young person has their own worldview as part of this dynamic landscape of belief, and it is crucial that schools help them get to grips with this core aspect of their identity."

<u>Statement by NATRE on the Parliamentary Question about Secondary</u> Teachers of RE:

"NATRE believes pupils deserve better, and that they should be taught by well-trained and qualified teachers. According to the government's own <u>teacher standards</u> (3), teachers must "demonstrate good subject and curriculum knowledge". It is difficult to see how these can be met when the proportion of specialist teachers is so low." Full statement <u>here</u>.

Children's Commissioner Shares her View on RE:

A member of the NATRE executive, Shammi Rahman, recently interviewed The Children's Commissioner, Dame Rachel de Souza. Dame Rachel is a previous RE teacher and headteacher and Shammi, is an ex secondary teacher and now a Race Equality Adviser. Dame Rachel used to be her RE teacher!

Dame Rachel says, 'as a former RE teacher myself, I believe RE teachers have a crucial opportunity to teach children about the wider world and principals of fairness and equality. It was great to talk about how different faiths can teach us different things, for example treating others as we would like to be treated ourselves; having compassion for others; and celebrating the beauty of life in our environment.'
