



**Councillor Elaine Lynch:** 'I am the new Cumberland Council Executive Member for Lifelong Learning and Development which includes everything to do with Education and SEND. I am a retired Secondary School teacher and Head of Sixth Form, spending more than 30 years teaching at The Nelson Thomlinson School in Wigton. I am a local lass, born and bred in Aspatria, and actually attended Nelson Thomlinson before going off to university in Sheffield, the first in my family to do so. I studied History at Sheffield then went to Exeter University to do my PGCE before moving to Bedford for my first teaching post in a multicultural school where I taught Humanities at Key Stage 3 and History at exam level.

On moving back to Wigton, I continued to teach History at all levels and also RE at Key Stage 3 and 4, following the Cumbria SACRE RE syllabus. I really enjoyed teaching RE, exploring a range of faiths and important ethical issues from different perspectives.

The education of our children and young people in Cumberland is something that I am very passionate about. A good education is the key to success and a religious education is vital to ensure that all our children and young people have the opportunity to develop their knowledge of the different faiths and ideas that make up our world so that they can be understanding of others and learn to live in harmony together.'

Councillor Sue Sanderson: "I am currently Cabinet Member for Childrens Services, Education and Skills for Westmorland and Furness council. I have been both a District and County Councillor. I was a primary school teacher with a specialist qualification in SEND sponsored by Wigan Metropolitan Borough. I moved to Cumbria with my family in 1986 when the Code of practice was introduced. I worked for Learning Support then became a primary teacher/SENCo and subsequently Headteacher of a primary school

I took on the role of a school improvement adviser for Lancashire County Council based in the north and specialising in SEND, then moved on to the Monitoring and Evaluation team a County wide team supporting schools through inspection. My specialism was SEND and I was given the additional responsibility of the SACRE. I worked closely with the RE advisory teacher being responsible for the review of the syllabus. We also made close links with Bradford SACRE and developed a Youth SACRE. I was then asked to run a secondary special school for pupils with SEMH difficulties aged 11 to 16 which had gone into special measures they were all boys. We got it out of special measures and it was (and still is) good. I then retired and became a councillor and I am so pleased to help with SACRE."

#### Inter Faith Week (12th to 19th November 2023)

Inter Faith Week takes part across the UK every year in November. This is a great time to celebrate the faiths within your school's community. This year, RE Teachers in Cumbria Local Group is holding an online meeting on 9th November at 4pm, prior to Inter Faith Week 2023, to help schools plan towards future events. Cumbria have a wealth of speakers available from a wide variety of faiths and beliefs. These speakers are happy to come into school and share their faith or belief with teachers and pupils. #### The Aims of Inter Faith Week are to:

- Strengthen good inter faith relations at all levels.
- Increase awareness of the different and distinct faith communities in the UK, in particular celebrating and building on the contribution which their members make to their neighbourhoods and to wider society.
- Increase understanding between people of religious and non-religious beliefs.

#### Remembrance

- Inter Faith Week coincides with Remembrance Sunday. Multi-faith remembrance services and activities are a key part of Inter Faith Week and reinforce good inter faith relations and understanding between people of all beliefs, whether religious or nonreligious.
- Civic Remembrance events and activities are typically organised by local authorities across the country, and many are run on a multi-faith basis. Local inter faith groups often play an important role in these activities.
- Remembrance looks back; it is also a place from which to look forwards and reflect on how to work together for a peaceful and just world.

#### Mitzvah Day

#### **Religious Literacy needed for challenging times**



"RE is primarily about enabling pupils to make academically informed judgements about matters of religion and belief which shape the local and global landscape. High-quality RE is about developing pupils' religious literacy. In the context of this syllabus, being religiously literate means that pupils will have the ability to hold balanced and well-informed conversations about religious and non-religious worldviews. Pupils will be able to make sense of religion and worldviews around them and begin to understand the complex world in which they live."

"Pupils are encouraged to explore how religious and non-religious worldviews relate to each other, recognising diversity within and between personal and organised worldviews. This will enable pupils to reflect on the significance of interfaith dialogue and the important contribution this can make to combatting prejudice and discrimination, including racist and/or religious hate crime such as Islamophobia and anti-Semitism. Teachers should be role models of inclusivity and acceptance encouraging pupils to be respectful and accepting towards people with different religious or non-religious worldviews to their own.

We have all felt deep shock and heartbreak at the events in Israel and Gaza over the past weeks. As teachers we are conscious of our responsibilities. We are also deeply aware that many friends and colleagues are directly and indirectly affected by the tragic violence, humanitarian need and fear that has engulfed the region. This deep personal impact applies to many in our local communities, including students, teachers and parents.

This is a time for both solidarity and sensitivity. The current situation is in no sense a war between Jews and Muslims. Continuing to educate children and young people about Judaism, Islam and other religions and world views is critical. We know that our schools are places where pupils can grapple with difficult and contested questions in a context of integrity, though of course this has to be done with great care, timing and judgment.

The Board of Deputies of British Jews has prepared a <u>letter</u> for headteachers and governors that offers advice on pastoral support and challenging antisemitism.

The Muslim Council of Britain has produced some <u>guidance</u> which similarly challenges both antisemitism and islamophobia and to calls for our communities to avoid division, despite different and deeply held views.

#### <u>Cumbrian SACRE Agreed Syllabus 2023 – Year of Implementation</u>

We are delighted to inform you that the main speaker for the next Cumbrian SACRE RE Conference (Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2024) will be National RE Adviser, Julia Diamond-Conway. Prior to joining RE Today in 2014, Julia was a primary teacher for 14 years. During this time, she was an Advanced Skills Teacher for both RE and Behaviour for Learning which allowed her to work with a large number of colleagues and pupils from several schools within her local authority. Julia advises a SACRE in London and was involved in setting up Ambassadors of Faith and Belief schemes (AFABS). This is a scheme where sixth formers are trained to give Q & A about their faith or belief in primary schools. More information about Julia here.

The main focus of the conference will be to:

- Prepare teachers for implementing the new Cumbrian Agreed Syllabus as a planning tool, exploring supportive resources and assessment practice.
- Gain fresh insights, strategies and subject knowledge to take away and implement in your own school setting.

- Understand how FoRB (Freedom of Religion or Belief) principles can contribute to excellent RE.

#### <u>Grasmere School visit St Bega, St Mungo and St Herbert Orthodox</u> <u>Church Braithwaite, Keswick by Phil Lambert</u>

We are an Orthodox Church Community founded by Fr John Musther near Keswick. The church itself is a typical Orthodox Church with icons everywhere, candles, the lingering fragrance of incense and few chairs.

In June this year we were thrilled to welcome Jo Goode the headteacher of Grasmere School and 11 children aged 8-9, with two adult assistants.

How though should we enable these bright children with their interest and curiosity to be able at many levels to understand this strange to them chapel? We started by bringing them into the kitchen and lounge area for us to get to know each other. It was a good time that helped us all relax- including me!

We really wanted the children to "experience" our place of worship with all their senses. Before they came into church we asked them leave their hats and coats behind and to use their eyes and noses but not their lips as they entered the church. They were fantastic and entered quietly and sat down.

In order for them to see what kind of thing went on, I then venerated the icon of Christ Pantocrator (the ruler of all) and the icon of the Mother of God (Mary) which are in the middle of the chapel and lit a candle.





I then sang the "Trisagion" three times which is a very special and holy hymn and if they wished I said they could join in. They did too!

After that the questions flowed about icons, movements such as crossing oneself, why we touch the floor when we cross ourselves, incense (which was not lit but they smelled the gum and they noticed the fragrance in the room) and so forth. So many moving questions from why there is gold in icons to, "Is God real?"!





They covered a lot of ground and they loved the idea that the candle is made of beeswax ( the prayer of the bees) and incense the prayer of flowers and gum used by God's blessing to prepare us and our church for worship and a sign of our prayers lifting up to God.

We talked about Holy Communion and how babies, children and then the old and infirm receive the bread and wine of Holy Communion first. They were surprised but pleased. There were also questions about fasting and the prayer of the body.

The interest and engagement of the children for an hour was amazing. The most moving part was at the end. I invited those who wished to come and light a candle. Most did remembering out loud a relative who had died. Sometimes they lit one just for themselves. It was really touching.

The text from St John Chrysostom on the door by the chapel was very appropriate so I read it to them twice, "Those who we love and close are no longer where they were: they are now wherever we are".

For us it was lovely to have the school come and visit our place of worship. It was also very helpful and stimulating to hear and have to answer all the questions - even with a "I don't know". Our own faith is invigorated experiencing it afresh having to answer questions that are not ours. It was at the time and on reflection a moving experience. Many thanks to Jo Goode and the pupils of Grasmere School for coming to see us. We are always pleased to have visits from all schools with primary and secondary.

#### The Lack of Trained RE Teachers

STOP PRESS: On Tuesday, 10 October, the Department for Education in England published its plans for bursaries for trainees in the 2024-25 recruitment cycle as follows:

For 2024 to 2025 we are offering bursaries of:

- £28,000 in chemistry, computing, mathematics and physics
- £25,000 in biology, design and technology, geography and languages (including ancient languages)
- £10,000 in art and design, English, music and RE

While this is good news, challenges in teacher recruitment still remain.

#### 2.) Religion Media Centre Briefing on Shortage of RE Teachers

The Religion Media Centre is an independent, impartial body helping journalists and media professionals cover world religions and beliefs. It highlighted in a September briefing the shortage of religious education (RE) teachers. Only six people have come forward to train as RE teachers



in Wales, and in England, no RE teacher training courses have reached their target of entries.

Hundreds have their applications pending because their degrees have not been finalised due to the university lecturers' strike action. Dr Tim Hutchings, from the University of Nottingham, told the briefing that there was a dangerous cycle emerging in the study of Religious Education: fewer students are choosing to study Theology or Religious Studies at university and fewer still choosing to train to teach RE whereas GCSE entries are stable (RE remaining as the 7<sup>th</sup> most popular subject) and A-level results only show a slight dip in entries.

Teachers, academics and advisers told the briefing that Headteachers want to include RE in the curriculum as the understanding of religion is vital in a global society, but the lack of specialist teachers is an issue. National Content Standard released: The RE Council's National Content Standard was released in September 2023. It provides a non-statutory benchmark for syllabus providers and other bodies to evaluate their work. It is specifically for use in England. It is not a curriculum, and it does not determine precisely what content schools should teach. Rather it is a standard by which different RE curricula, content, pedagogy, and provision can be benchmarked. More information <a href="here">here</a>. Cumbrian SACRE are confident that the new syllabus reflects this standard and members of the working group will be looking in more detail in November as part of their evaluation process and new development plan.

#### A Level Results:

Sarah Lane Cawte, Chair of the Religious Education Council of England and Wales (REC), has said in response to a decline in the number taking A level Religious Studies:

"These results show the really concerning impact that teacher retention and recruitment is having on the subject. For the last two decades, A level Religious Studies has been a success story with growing numbers of entries and impressive results that have opened up a world of opportunity, particularly for people from disadvantaged backgrounds, providing them with access to top universities and careers in law, journalism and teaching.

"That legacy is now threatened. A teacher training bursary and a fair allocation of resources to the subject would help reverse this trend and ensure RE continues to thrive as it has done for the last decades."

Religious Studies A level exam entries have decreased by 3.5 percent in England and 24 percent in Wales. The fall comes as the overall number of A level entries in England and Wales increased this year by 2 percent from 812,124 in 2022 to 830,312 in 2023. 14,690 students took an RS A level in England in 2023 compared with 15,216 in 2022, while in Wales entries were recorded at 748, a fall from 982. A level entries for RS also fell last year by 2.7 percent, despite a 6.1% increase in 2021. Between 2003 and 2022, A level RS has been one of the fastest growing subjects at A level, with an increase of 39 percent in the number of entries to the subject.

The fall follows the launch of a campaign to recruit a new generation of RE teachers to the subject, with the Religious Education Council of England and Wales warning that a shortage in specialist teachers means some schools, particularly in the Midlands and North East, are now struggling to offer the subject at A level.

A level Religious Studies is the humanities subject most likely to be taken by disadvantaged pupils. Research by the FFT Education Datalab has found that this group is twice as likely to choose to study A level Religious Studies than their peers.

#### **GCSE Results:**

Religious Studies remains a popular GCSE despite specialist teacher recruitment challenge. The number of students in England and Wales taking a GCSE course in Religious Studies has remained stable at 253,906, up by a margin of 0.3% from last year. The slight rise in entries comes as a campaign supported by cross party politicians intends to attract a new generation of teachers to the subject, focusing on the restoration of training bursaries. The latest UCAS data showed applicants to train to teach the subject had fallen by a one-third.

The number of GCSE entries this year means that RS is taken by more students than Business Studies, Design and Technology, and Art and Design at GCSE. Despite this, the number of hours of RE taught by teachers with no post-A level qualification remains one of the highest at 26%. Half of teachers delivering RE lessons spend most of their timetables teaching a different subject. This has led subject leaders and politicians to reissue their call for a National Plan for the subject and for the reinstatement of bursaries for trainee RE teachers.

Sarah Lane Cawte, Chair of the Religious Education Council of England and Wales (REC), said:

"RS is one of the most popular subjects at GCSE, yet bizarrely it does not receive the corresponding funding and support. Teacher training applications have not recovered since the axing of the bursary in 2021, and no money has been spent on the subject for five years. We want an even distribution of funding across the curriculum to ensure young people taking the subject receive their fair share of support from the government."

Father of the House, Sir Peter Bottomley MP, who first called for a National Plan for the subject after chairing a parliamentary roundtable on its future last year, also responded to the results:

"RE continues to play a pivotal part in the education of young people across the country, allowing them to understand and academically engage with some of the moral and theological debates that continue to inform our society. A National Plan would scale out a modern and relevant curriculum in the faiths, cultures and beliefs of modern Britain taught by highly trained and committed teachers. Neglecting the subject in this fashion does a disservice to the quarter of a million young people who take it at GCSE every year."

#### **NATRES Call to Action with MPs:**

In late September and early October, teams of teachers from NATRE joined representatives from the Religious Education Council of England and Wales (REC), Culham St Gabriel's and RE Today to attend the Labour, Conservative and Liberal Democrat party conferences.

This lobbying work that NATRE do on the behalf of teachers is really important because it enables them to take the voices of teachers and pupils to policy makers. At the party conferences, they shared the importance of high-quality RE for all pupils in all schools, talking about the need for a national standard in the subject, sharing constituency data related to RE with MPs, SACRE members, local councillors and party members and talking about what high-quality RE looks like in Primary and Secondary classrooms.

#### A Level and GCSE Results 2023:

NATRE have published detailed reports covering GCSE and A level RS in both England and Wales. They reveal many similarities and some differences between the two nations in relation to trends over time. It is clear that the removal of the short course from performance tables has had a devastating impact on the number of children leaving school with a qualification in Religious Studies. In many cases, the loss of the short course has coincided with an increase in the number of schools reporting zero hours of timetable time for RE in year 11 in the school workforce data. At A level, entries have remained fairly stable over recent years in England but in Wales, there is a step decline, of around 33% since 2020. The reasons for this need further investigation.

#### **SACRE Regional Meetings:**

In November, a series of new regional meetings will be held for SACRE Chairs/Vice chairs, LA officers and professional support officers, working with their RE Hub lead and NASACRE Exec member. This session taking place in regions will allow for a smaller number of SACREs to come together; it continues NASACREs conversation with their membership, to share good practice, national and local news and giving time for SACRE leadership teams to raise, discuss and help to support each other.

In the North West, there is already an established termly meeting convened by Lancashire SACRE as the North West SACRE Hub. Rather than duplicate this meeting, this will be included as part of the existing agenda. This meeting is currently attended by Shelia Gewolb and Jane Yates from Cumbrian SACRE.

#### **Humanism and Group A of SACREs:**

A recent judgement has been made concerning the position of Humanists on Group A of SACREs. In the case of *Bowen v Kent County Council* Justice Constable clarified that applications for Group A membership from persons who represent holders of non-religious beliefs should be considered in the same way as applications from those who represent holders of religious beliefs.

NASACRE has been long asking the DfE to issue guidance to Local Authorities regarding the position of non-religious Worldviews on Group A, and they are pleased that this <u>guidance</u> was issued in August.

In brief, the guidance reiterates that the make-up of a SACRE is a matter for Local Authorities (not SACREs themselves), and that the membership of Group A should ensure that relevant traditions and beliefs in the local authority's area are appropriately reflected. This representation may include non-religious belief systems where they are analogous to a religious belief.

NASACRE advises that SACREs may wish to advise their Local Authorities that they should review the constitution of the SACRE following publication of the 2021 Census data in the light of this guidance.

- These can be, but should not be, obscured by attention to Hinduism's 'strangeness' or exotic appearance.
- Informed teaching about the meaning of **yoga** is lacking, but should be included; the same also applies to **puia**.

**RE Online Resource of the Month - Shia Islam GCSE Text Book**: FREE book on Islam, focusing on Shia Islam. This book is kindly given to users of RE:ONLINE by the Al Khoei Foundation, who published the book in 2017, when Shia Islam was first included in the GCSE. 

Exploring Hindu Worldviews (Primary): This volume provides knowledge-rich substantive content about Hindu weddings, festivals such as Holi, Raksha Bandhan a Ganesha Charturthi, Ganesha Murtis, inspirational figures and the understanding and impact of the concept of ahimsa. Younger pupils can explore Holi and Raksha Bandhan actively through photographs and stories. Marriage is a significant rite of passage and images from 'Auntie Anita's' wedding make an excellent photo album, available to members as an ebook with flippable pages. The importance of Ganesha to Hindu devotees is investigated through stories and a festival. Inspiring figures Jalaram Bapa




and his wife Virbai, are shared, with an example of a mandir that honours this guru. Finally the key concept of ahimsa is unpacked through philosophy, thoughts of young Hindus, and two charity case studies.

**Investigating Hindu Worldviews (Secondary):** The third in our Investigating Worldviews acknowledges the complexity and diversity of Hindu tradition and seeks to present something of this for the classroom together with practical knowledge.

Surveys from 2001 and 2023 give voice to young Hindus in Britain. Hindu traditions in the UK are further explored with a look at demographic data and places of worship, including an outline of different kinds of mandirs in England. Case studies consider the impact of Hanuman in the lives of some Hindus and an example of Dharma in action. The role of gurus in the UK and beyond is explored with a personal account from a devotee and examples of four contemporary Hindu gurus. Students investigate the significance of pilgrimage from a personal reflection and develop their own knowledge of key sites which demonstrate the importance of the river Ganges to many Hindus.


