Macaully had previously received a medal for being one of the "Contemptibles." He was a member of the Cumberland Police Force at the commencement of hostilities, and has served the full three years. He has been wounded twice. Corpl. Macaully was the only one left of the old Coldstream Guards. He has the heartiest congratulations of his friends and acquaintances in Whitehaven and district on this latest recognition of his bravery and worth as a soldier.

# AN ENNERDALIAN IN MESOPOTAMIA.

The following extract is from an interesting letter received by the secretary of the Ennerdale and Kinniside War Committee from Corpl. Thos. J. Rawling, now serving with a Motor Machine Gun Battery in Mesopotamia. "I received your letter and P.O. on Xmas Day, and must thank you and the committee most heartily for your kindness It was peculiar after the letter taking nearly two months that it should arive here on the exact day. We all had quite a lot of letters that day, so tried to imagine that we were having a real Christmas Day. It took some doing, though, I can tell you. We have just had our first winter rains, and everything is absolutely mud up, worse than Ennerdale roads, even after your worst periods of rain.

Rawling is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Rawling, Hollins, Ennerdale, and was at the time of his enlistment assistant master at Distington Council School.
